You can then turn around, purchase one of the many eligible, electric lawn mowers and receive a huge rebate through the Valley Air District's Clean Green Yard Machines lawn mower trade-in program.

This popular program is open to all San Joaquin Valley residents and offers as much as \$250 back on the cost of an eligible electric mower.
