Lawn mower trade-in begins Earth Day weekend

New program eliminates long lines

Clean Green Yard Machines 2007 begins Earth Day weekend, offering Valley residents an even easier method of retiring those old, gas-burning lawn mowers in exchange for an incredible price on electric mowers.

Each year, the Air District offers residents huge discounts on non-polluting mowers. One gas mower can emit as much pollution as 40 new or late-model cars operating over the same period of time. Electric mowers produce no on-site emissions, are lighter, quieter and easy to use.

This year, participants won't have to wait in long lines at single-day events or travel outside their county to take advantage of this offer. Instead, the Air District will give Valley residents a six-week period to request a program voucher, turn in their old, gas-powered mowers at a recycling center in their county, and purchase a new, cordless, electric mower for just \$150 (regular price: \$418.95).

Here's how the program works:

- Upon request, the Air District will provide a coded voucher to a Valley resident.
- The resident then takes the voucher and their old mower, drained of all fluids, to a participating recycler.
- Once the retired mower is received, the recycler will add a coded sticker to the voucher.
- The resident can then call the Neuton Lawn Company's toll-free number to order their new mower, including a rear bag, rechargeable battery and mulching kit, at 64 percent off the regular price.
- The new mower will be delivered directly to the customer's home within a few days.


Air District rolls out redesigned elementary school curriculum
